Edible Landscape Pack – 3 each of Red Currant & Serviceberry; 2 each of Blueberry & Paw Paw

Evergreen Transplant Pack* – 2 ea. White Pine, White Spruce, White Cedar, Balsam Fir & Red Pine *Ranging in size 8"-18"

Nut Pack – 3 each of Bitternut & Hazelnut; 2 each of Northern Pecan & Black Walnut

Pollinator Pack – 2 each of Red Osier Dogwood, Choke Cherry, American Plum, Meadowsweet & Pasture Rose

Wildlife Pack – 2 each of American Hazelnut, American Plum, Ninebark, Red Osier Dogwood & Swamp White Oak

***Colorado Blue Spruce is no longer recommended for planting in Ohio due to fungal infections**

Plant Descriptions

Dawn Redwood: (*Metasequoia glyptostroboides*) This deciduous conifer produces small, round 1/2" to 1" cones. It has a pyramidal shape in youth, maturing into a rounded crown. The bright green, feathery leaves turn orange-brown or reddish-brown in the fall. Fast-growing, easily transplanted. Likes full sun and prefers moist, deep, well-drained soils. One of the fastest-growing trees available. Grows to 70'-100', with a 25' spread.

Douglas Fir: (*Pseudotsuga menziesii*) Is a straight-trunked tree, with a spire-like crown, and the capacity to grow over 295' tall and have a diameter of 13'. The upper branches of the tree point up and the lower branches droop down and recurve. They are good for windbreaks and do well in clay soils.

Norway Spruce: (*Picea abies*) Large, cone-bearing tree with straight trunk and pyramid-shaped crown of spreading branches. Grows best in fertile soil with ample moisture. Good for shelters & wind breaks. Grows to 80'.

Scotch Pine: (*Pinus sylvestris*) A beautiful evergreen which is hardy and adaptable to nearly all climates. Grows to 60' tall with a 40' spread. Grows at a medium rate in full sun. Does best in well drained soils.

Swamp White Oak: (*Quercus bicolor*) Large shade oak tree with crown shape, bi-colored leaves and acorns. Grows well in full sun and in most soil types. Can be planted variety of soils, from clay to sandy. Grows from 49-65' tall.

Arborvitae (White Cedar): (*Thuja occidentalis*) Features tiny, scale-like leaves that are packed closely together in overlapping rows on branchlets, displaying in a flattened, fan-like spray; the leaves change from bright green in the summer to a multitude of rich yellow-brown-green hues in the winter. Adapts well to shearing and shaping. Yields light brown or reddish-brown oblong cones that are 3/8-1/2" long and persist through winter; cone scales are blunt-tipped and separate from each other at the base. Can be planted 3' apart for a low-maintenance hedge. Grows in a pyramidal shape.

Eastern White Pine: (*Pinus strobus*) Fast growing to 100'. A five needled pine, with soft, light green-blue needles, 4" long. Can tolerate dry, rocky soil and grows in normal moisture conditions. Excellent ornamental tree, windbreaks, wildlife habitat.

Black Walnut: (*Juglans nigra*) This tree can grow from 100-130' tall. The fruit nut ripens and will fall off the tree in October or November. This tree has a pungent or spicy odor. Fruiting may begin in the first 4-6 years but can take longer. Grows best on sandy loam, loam, silt loam type soils but will also grow well on silty clay loam soils. It prefers these soils due to the fact that these soils hold large quantities of water which the tree draws from during dry periods.

Butternut: (*J. cinerea*) A slow growing deciduous tree, growing approx. 66' tall. Rarely lives longer than 75 years. This tree flowers from April-June & the fruit is a lemon shaped nut. Grows best in well drained soils.

American Hazelnut: (*Corylus americana*) This is a nut producing shrub, that grows 15-18' tall & a spread of 10-12' at maturity. Has a medium to fast growth rate, growing anywhere from 13-24" a year. Full sun to partial shade is best. Should be planted in multiples to ensure cross pollination. It grows in acidic, alkaline, loamy, moist, rich, sandy, well-drained and clay soils. It is drought-tolerant. The nuts produced by this shrub are a preferred by squirrels, deer, turkey, woodpeckers, pheasants, grouse, quail and jays.

Northern Pecan: (*Carya illinoensis*) A large tree growing 66-131' in height. It has a spread of 39-75' wide. This a fruit tree that falls under the hickory species. The pecans have a rich, buttery flavor and can be eaten fresh or used in cooking

Choke Cherry: (*Prunus virginiana* L.) Uses include plantings in shelterbelts, windbreaks, wildlife plantings, and mass plantings for erosion control. A native, perennial, deciduous, woody, thicket-forming large erect shrub or small tree. It rarely reaches a height of over 30 feet. The crown is irregular and from 10 to 20 feet wide when mature. The stems are numerous and slender.

Meadowsweet: (*Filipendula Ulmaria*) Plant this bush in a partially shaded, well drained area. Flowers grow in clusters and are light, feathery and fragrant. Flowers in June to September and soils must remain moist. Bush will get to between 24-50" in size.

Pasture Rose: (*Rosaceae*) This shrub is approx. 3' tall, has a rose fragrance, blooms early summer and last about a month. Plant in full to partial sun, in average to dry soils. Flowers provide nectar for several types of bees.

American Plum: (*Prunus americana*) Tall, flowery shrub to small tree which is thorny and winter hardy. Can be used as farmstead windbreaks. Grows 8-10' tall, base is 8-10' wide, adaptable to all soil types and grows well in full to partial sun.

Ninebark: (*Physocarpus opulifolius*) Also known as Common Ninebark. Has clusters of white flowers in the spring and red fruits in the autumn. Grows from 3-9' tall. Grows well in moist soils.

Red Osier Dogwood: (*Cornus sericea*) Open, spreading, medium to large shrub. Grows 7-10' tall and 10-15' wide, flowers are dull white with medium to dark green leaves. Adaptable to a variety of soils, grows well in full to partial shade.
